

To sum it up, according to the authors, becoming an inventor in America relies upon excelling in math and science, while also being male, white, and having a rich family. The research does not portray these as subtle factors that result in moderate differences but rather overwhelmingly skewed demographic differences.



Corners Outreach offers Three Paths of Impact for our community. All three change lives. Often those who enter one path add another path, and then invite others to join them and connect with Corners.



Itzel is a mother of a Gwinnett Academy student. Upon seeing her connections in the community and her dedication to safety, she was hired as a Corners Outreach van driver. Itzel was so committed to the job, she was quickly promoted to Transportation Coordinator, while continuing to run a daily route. Her van picks up 12 elementary students from their homes and transports them to Gwinnett Academy to receive tutoring in reading and math. Itzel has now driven 960 trips and over 3,000 miles! The Corners Outreach vans allow us to hire parents to pick up students whose families do not have a driver's license or a car or are unable to get off work to bring their students to the Academy.

In 2022, Corners created and paid out over \$1,500,000 in wages to local parents. In addition to lawn care, we pay living wages to part time teachers, van drivers, leather workers, parent ambassadors and cleaning staff. WOW! That is the best word I could find to describe my feelings about 2022. I want to start by thanking you for your continued support of Corners. **To our donors, volunteers, staff, and board members – Thank You**! What an amazing year. It was our 10th year of operation, and we shattered all previous records for every relevant category of performance that we track!

- Donations were up 69% year over year.
- Student enrollment was up 22% year over year.
- Test scores for Corners Academy students are up over 55% in every category.
- Revenues from our lawn care business were up 20% year over year.

All of this while starting our workforce staffing company and embarking on a major capital campaign.

We realize that the pandemic along with social injustice, economic pressures, and lack of access to learning tools/infrastructure left many in our communities in a dark place. Students have fallen behind due to remote learning for example. However, this has allowed Corners to shine even brighter! We have so much more planned for 2023, and we will need your continued support to achieve our plans. First, we would like to thank you for your support of our capital campaign to purchase our new community center and roll out our new programming. We have secured \$6,500,000 of our targeted \$10,000,000. Securing this building and funding will allow us to begin our vocational training for careers such as welding, electrician, plumbing, HVAC and others. This will enable us to take our focus on the whole family to the next level and provide better earning wages for our families!

I hope that as you read this note you will feel not only my gratitude but my optimism for our future. And, as Leonard Sweet says, "*The future is not something we enter. The future is something we create.*" I am confident that with your support and prayers, Corners will continue this important work of bringing light to our underserved communities and the families we serve together. Thank you again for everything you have done in 2022, and we look forward to serving alongside you as we strive to have an even greater impact in 2023.



After spending almost two years searching, we are pleased to share that we purchased an ideal property located at 1854 Shackleford Court in Norcross, directly within the center of Corners' desired 30093 zip code. The four-story, 94,677 sq. ft. building is situated on six acres with easy access to local interstates, an important feature for both students and workers.

Built in 1985, the building has been well maintained including recent upgrades to HVAC, bathrooms, elevators, and the roof. Three-quarters of the building will require little to no construction. Only the second floor will require significant work as it has been stripped to the exterior shell, but this will allow us to renovate specifically to accommodate our planned expansions of Corners Academy and Workforce Academy.

The layout will be as follows:

 The first floor will feature a welcoming center for families for programs and events, Corners corporate offices, and operational space for Corners Industries. This floor will also house Corners Church, a non-denominational church welcoming all. While the two entities are separate, they share a common faith within the community. A sec-

ing programs. Renovations are anticipated to take six to eight weeks, so programming can commence in time for summer. The third floor is currently vacant but configured as office space which can be leased immediately to businesses or other community nonprofits to provide complimentary wrap-around services to families. We are currently in conversations with five nonprofits to utilize this space to deliver support services such as nutritional assistance, mental health assessments, English classes, and services targeted to the Pan Asian community.

tion of the first floor is being reserved for a tenant to offer other community services to our families, and we have been in extensive discussions with the Atlanta Community Food Bank to utilize this space for a unique mobile food delivery pilot program.

The second floor will house Corners Academy and Workforce Academy. The space will meet the immediate need for additional space with ample room for all Corners Academy students and will also house workforce classes, participants, and equipment related to vocational training programs. Renovations are anticipated to take six to eight weeks, so programming can commence in time for summer.

• The Georgia Department of Community Affairs office currently utilizes most of the fourth floor, and we are in conversation to have them lease the entire floor with a seven-year lease term. By 2025, we anticipate that the earned revenue stream from all leased spaces will largely cover the building's operational expenses, ensuring the long-term sustainability of not only Corners Outreach programming, but that of our partners as well.

For our families, a community center offers many things they do not currently have. Our workforce space will have a computer library, printer, internet, etc. We will have a "hands on" lab for our teens and adults with 3D printers, other equipment, etc.

Our academy will have a dedicated teen center both for tutoring and fun. Our music room will have opportunities to learn and practice with instruments. Community leadership can speak to our families in our auditorium as they feel safe and secure at Corners. Our support services will also cover food needs connected to our programs, insurance support, immigration support, mental health, etc.

2022 Highlights



Corners Academy experienced **record-breaking growth in attendance and participation**, working with more than 650 students across three sites.

Corners Staffing with a Purpose placed 35 candidates in positions that pay a living wage, offer benefits, and provide opportunities for career growth, and had a 69% retention rate.



The Corners Leather Project began a new custom leather good partnership with both Butler University and the University of Oklahoma.

Corners Early Learning **Pre-K Prep camp graduated 20 students** ages 3-5, setting them on the right path for going into a formal Pre-K program or Kindergarten.



Corners Music Academy Students performed at three recitals, six community performances, and raised more than \$50,000 to expand our Music Program.

The Corners Quest Teen Program **more than doubled in attendance** from the beginning of 2022 to the end of the year.



Corners fundraising events topped \$375,000 in 2022.

Lawn Care with a Purpose had a record year serving over 400 clients for lawn maintenance and projects like drainage, sod, retaining walls, fire pits, concrete, shrub, flowers, mulch, pine straw, and more.

One bright morning, a Corners teacher began the day with a joke about pets. After most the students laughed, one of the students raised a hand and shared that their pet was left behind in their home country when they came to the United States.

Then other students began sharing stories of the things, people, and lives they left behind when they traveled to this country. The teacher took extra time to listen to each student's story. This created a community of empathy and mutual understanding.

This bond then helped build character and motivation for their life and to achieve their academic goals. We could not do this without the welcoming community that is being built within each of our classrooms.


2022 was a record-breaking year for Corners Academy! We experienced 22% growth in the attendance of our after school and summer programs which means we worked with over 650 students and their families! We also expanded our collective impact work with many community partners, including, <u>Gwinnett County Public</u> Schools, Helping Mammas, The City of Dunwoody, DeKalb County Public Schools, Lettum Eat, Georgia Power, UPS and a whole host of other wonderful organizations! In addition to launching our first ever full-day summer camp, we also took steps to serve our students with the build-out of a new **multi-language program**. This will go a long way in helping our Spanish only speaking students catch up with their academics. 2022 truly was a year of expansion and growth that sets us up to reach even more students and families in the days ahead!

Corners Academy | Early Learning

Corners cares about the whole family and that includes our youngest family members! From birth to 5 years old, some of the most important development of our lives happens. Unfortunately, many of our families do not have access to preschools or enrichment opportunities for their

young children. Corners Early Learning Program works with both children and their parents to prepare our youngest students for success in kindergarten through Mami Y Yo (our Mommy and Me Program) and a Kindergarten readiness summer camp.

Early Learning Highlights from 2022:




- We had more than 20 students ages 3-5 who participated in our Pre-K summer camp.
- We held our first Helping Mama's partnership pick-up. We received more than 55 items for 22 different children that consisted of diapers, toys, three highchairs, clothes, and formula and so much more.

In 2023, Pilar's role will expand to full time as the Early Learning Program Director, allowing her to grow the program to impact more babies, toddlers and parents of small kids.



From both Elementary Academy locations, students demonstrated:



With tremendous effort from volunteers and certified teachers, Corners Academy saw significantly improved grades in reading and math for attending students. This was especially true for dual-language learners.

Summer camp filled a serious void in the lives of our elementary students. Having camp five days a week gave our students a safe and enriching place to spend their summer days while parents worked. Students were able to continue studies, stay connected with their friends, enjoy a healthy meal, and continue to grow through a variety of games and experiences. Meanwhile, parents have the peace of mind knowing their children are cared for while they can't be with them.

With growth in both our Early Learning and Teen Programs, our elementary tutoring is a bridge that seamlessly connects these worlds together, continuing student growth from birth through high school graduation. The after-school tutoring formula consists of homework assistance, curriculum-guided instruction in reading and math, social and emotional learning activities, physical and nutritional health, and vocational exposure.

Just as importantly, **our students learn** that they are competent, smart, and can experience real improvement with hard work. They also learn to ask for help when needed—instilling a confidence that is essential for success in middle school, high school, and beyond.



In 2022, Corners Academy Elementary:

- We had our all-time max of 240 students register for our 2022 summer camp and engaged 100 new students in tutoring.
 - Our first clothing drive donated items to 430 individuals in our community.
 - Fall of 2022 had the most **consistent** engagement in our parent workshops, with 18 families attending.







Corners Academy | Quest Teen Development

In 2022, Corners continued to expand our Teen Development Program to support our students once they graduate out of Corners Academy Elementary tutoring. We branded our program as the Quest Teen Development Program, to help our students remember that their next step is their best step.

The transition from childhood to adulthood is tough in the best of circumstances. We work with our students from economically challenged communities to build a strong support system. Each student is known and respected—and the Quest Teen Development Program makes sure all students have the tools needed to graduate from high school and build a full life afterward.

Teen Development Highlights from 2022:

- We more than doubled our attendance from beginning of 2022 to the end of the year.
- Our newly developed in-school workshops

earned a 4.5 overall rating from the students involved.

- We earned a 4 out of 5 rating from Quest students who were asked if they learned how emotions affected their body and actions.
- Our most highly attended day of the week has been Mondays where we explore career and vocational opportunities. Previously, Mondays were our least attended.
- **Quest hosted 20+ guest speakers** to expose students to a variety of different career and vocational pathways.

Corners Academy | Parent Workshops

As we work daily with the students, doors open to build strong relationships with their parents. Our goal with our parents is the same as with our students—to empower them to live full lives. Parent stability and success is essential to student stability and success.

⁶⁶ During our pilot in-school workshop, I asked a group of 12 students to find a photo on their phones that makes them smile. There was a wide range of pictures including family members, vacations, friends, significant others, and animals. One student shared a picture of her son. The baby was over a year old, and the student was in 11th grade. She likely got pregnant as a freshman. Instead of shock, I felt very proud of her. I can't imagine the pressure of being a teen mom, but she is pushing through and **trying to provide the best life for her and her son. She was very thankful for the workshop and was very interested in another workshop**. In fact, when asked 'What else would you like to learn about?' on our survey, she responded with "Anything.' She is hungry to learn and only needs the opportunities and resources to do so. This moment revealed to me the value of bringing Quest inside schools during operating hours, not only to give students a glimpse of what we do after school, but also to reach students like this one, who are asking for resources but may not have the time to invest after school. ⁹

Through active listening and intentional conversations with our parents, we discover the topics they want to learn more about. In 2022, we offered the following workshops:

- Issues of immigration law
- Financial literacy
- How to buy a home
- Understanding workers' rights

We also had various education awareness workshops:

- Understanding teacher conferences
- Parenting communication workshop
- Family systems and mental health workshop
- Integrative nutrition workshop
- Understand ESOL / IEP

We will have a listening session this spring to learn more about employment needs, which will allow an opportunity to understand what skill-based workshops we can bring to the parents in 2023.

Corners Academy | Music Academy

Corners Music Academy (CMA) aims to enrich the lives of our students by providing music classes and lessons at minimal cost to our families.

Our mission is to unlock the musical potential of our community while encouraging their individuality, talents, and expression. We believe that music should not be a luxury but rather an opportunity offered to all people regardless of income.

CMA offers music lessons to students K-12. We partner with musicians in our community to provide highest quality lessons. Students at Corners are invited to participate in:

- Music lessons in either piano, guitar, woodwind, strings, or voice
- Corners Children's Choir
- Corners Ukulele Ensemble
- Corners Music Teen Program

Corners is expanding Marianella Lopez's role to full-time Music Director, since the arts and performance can be an integral way to build confidence, teach hard-working and persistence and aid in the improvement of academic scores. With community performances, Corners Music Academy students give their musical gifts back to our community, empowering them to share their skills and passions.

This past year we worked with several community partners like Perimeter Church, the City of Dunwoody and others to offer community performances by our students at festivals and holiday parties. This helps our students give their musical gifts back to their community and to highlight the work and talents of our students. We plan to expand our partnerships through this program in 2023!

Corners Music Academy Highlights from 2022:

- **30 CMA students** received private music lessons by Corners Music Academy instructors or volunteers at reduced or free tuition.
- We **loaned 11 instruments** at no cost to our students.
- We held **three recitals** for families to witness their child's musical growth.
- CMA students attended more than 12 professional performing arts events including shows at the FOX theater, Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, Schwartz Center for Performing Arts at Emory, Atlanta Ballet and Sandy Springs Theater. These events exposed students and their families to the world of fine arts at no cost to them.
- CMA students performed at six community/ school events to audiences of over 300 people.
- **Corners Outreach raised over \$50,000** to support a five day a week music program at our locations!

Corners Academy | Food Distribution

At Corners Outreach we believe what happens at home matters greatly. So we invest heavily in understanding each family's needs to ensure we serve them well both at Corners and at home! For many families, the high cost of food made groceries too expensive, and they needed some extra help. So we expanded our partnership with <u>Diaz Foods</u> to provide approximately 200 boxes of ethnic food each month! We are grateful for the generosity of partners like Diaz Foods who give high quality food so generously to help the families of our community!



⁶⁶Being a part of Corners Music Academy (CMA) has helped me become more of an individual leader by teaching me how to set short and long-term goals that I can achieve. CMA led me to what I like best, which is playing the viola. With the encouragement of Miss Marianella, I joined the school orchestra and plan to continue in the Orchestra in high school.

Corners Music Academy has opened many doors, and I am grateful for these opportunities. I have been taking lessons with Corners Music teacher Daniel Boscan weekly for about a year. He is a great inspiration as he is in the Atlanta Symphony Youth Orchestra. At first, I didn't want to join my school orchestra because the kids at my school had more experience, and I was afraid I'd slow them down. But I quickly learned that my private lessons had put me on track with the other students in the orchestra.

Going to Corners Music Academy on Fridays is very important to me. I get to ask the teachers and my fellow students any questions that arose for me over the week. I also like helping the younger students that are just beginning to learn their instruments. Music on Fridays is a great opportunity to learn and teach on a weekly basis. $^{\prime\prime}$



2022 Highlights

In 2022, our focus was to improve profitability in the mowing business, so we can add more workers and give back 10% of revenue to tutoring. We focused on three objectives:

1. Service density pattern. In a services business, you need to maximize the time spent on a client's project and minimize the time spent driving to each client. By using computer driven routes and tracking data (every truck has a GPS, so we know the time at a client and in between clients), we did a client profitability rationalization and made some hard decisions reducing outlying clients. The net was higher profitability and less time by leadership on routes.

- 3. Teammates' wages have increased 45000 significantly. Our lawn care teams wages range from \$17/hour to \$25/hour. That 40000 is over 40% higher than when we began. We are thankful that our clients pay more 35000 than other lawn care providers because we are Lawn Care with a PURPOSE. 30000



Corners Workforce & Staffing

Corners Workforce Academy

Corners Workforce Academy was created to bridge the gap between the cycles of poverty in our community and the workforce needs of local businesses.

As businesses struggle to attract talented workers, Corners families struggle to make ends meet. Corners Workforce Academy brings these two pieces together through **professional staffing services to solve local labor shortages, drive economic development, and reduce cycles of poverty that plague our community.**

Corners' belief that education is fundamental for living a full life led to this program.

During the Covid-19 Pandemic, many students fell behind in school or dropped out altogether. For many, this was an economic necessity as youth became caregivers for younger kids while parents worked multiple jobs, or became income earners themselves. The drop-out rate was predictably accelerated in communities that are below the poverty level, exacerbating this cycle of poverty.

Through Workforce Academy, youth ages 16-24 will have the opportunity to **complete their high school degree or obtain their GED while earning a living wage and learning a trade from a qualified professional.** Certification programs and vocational tracks are both available. **Opportunities for youth include: leather work, HVAC, plumbing, electrical, construction, medical auxiliary roles, and language interpretation.**

All of this is done while **supporting youth through wrap-around services like financial literacy, food and transportation assistance, leadership development and mentorship**—a framework intended to reduce barriers to education and career options for the youth in our community. **Corners Workforce Academy is uniquely poised to provide the next generation with the mentors to help them on their way to living full lives.** Through the programs at Corners, youth are taught to prize their heritage and their language.

Staffing with a Purpose

Corners Staffing with a Purpose launched in April of 2022. Corners has successfully placed 35 people in jobs, launched the Corners Workforce Guide Program, and started assisting students, young adults, and experienced workers through workshops, presentations and partnerships through the Workforce Academy. We could not do any of this without our committed partners in the community who work with us to employ and support our families. Piedmont Bank, one of our long-standing partners, has not only contributed through participation in our Board, Gala, and generous donations, but has also expanded this partnership to give our families a chance to pursue careers in banking and finance!

Recently Angeni Lopez was referred to us for employment services, but like many of us when we were young adults, she was unsure of which path to take. We shared a teller/banker position which she decided to pursue. The Corners' team helped her build a resume and prepare for her interview. After the interview, she was ecstatic to tell us that she'd landed the job!

A few months later, Rosemarie Vermeersch, Director of Staffing, went to visit Angeni at her new job and Angeni, shared that she was welcomed warmly by the Piedmont Bank team. Tracy Winder, AVP and Branch Manager, is intentional about spending time with Angeni, equipping her to deliver superior customer service. Rosemarie was proud to see that Tracy has taken Angeni under her wing to teach her the tenants of good customer service and the details of the bank teller job. Angeni has done a great job in her new role, and we are so proud of her! Along with Tracy's support and mentorship, Angeni was paired with a Corners Workforce Guide who speaks with her 30 minutes per week with the goal of supporting her as

she adapts to her new job, and learning great tips for success as she advances in her career. Corners also leads Workforce Workshops and classes to bring guidance, support, and tools for our participants to learn and apply as they advance in their newly found jobs or in their quest for their career. These classes **empower workers to be active** participants in their growth trajectory at work, whether it's learning how to understand their paycheck, the basics of the working life, to make the best first impressions, career advancement or planning for retirement! We are so grateful for our partners and volunteers who make these initiatives successful and impactful.


