Letter from Larry

The impact of the Covid-19 pandemic will last a long time, with everyone being impacted in one way or another. Covid-19 revealed many disparities that we must improve. We continue our thankfulness for all who helped our families. In my consulting career, I learned to make observations before drawing conclusions. Here are some of my observations:

- There are racial inequities; some are systemic.
- · Through our efforts in giving food and healthcare, it is clear many do not understand the depth of poverty nor immigration issues.
- It is a struggle to replicate school at home and it's harder when there are multiple children and parents are working multiple jobs to make ends meet with no routine.
- Some teens are put in impossible positions by being asked to do these things: help younger siblings with online school, be successful in their own digital school, and/or make money for the family.

Our Corners staff is so close to our families that we almost feel we have lived through their experiences with them. We are blessed they trust us to share intimate details of their life with us.

At Corners, we know that we must do better to face the challenges we see. In 2020:

- We updated our mission, vision and values. Our new mission better encapsulates our work: Equip the whole family to lead full lives. Our vision is One community where every person thrives. In John 10:10, Jesus said I have come that they may have life and have it to the full.
- We created more jobs through Corners Industries. In 2020, we paid our parents over \$950,000. They earned the money, and it changed their life immediately. By providing income, we increase the possibilities and opportunities for whole families. By working together and sharing life, we can help them develop long-term solutions.
- We began offering **digital learning to** all direct services programs since transportation is an issue for both our students and our volunteers.

Third Culture Kids (Citizens of Everywhere and Nowhere)

I attended 13 different schools in my life and have lived in 3 different countries. I thank God that I had understanding parents, but half the time, I was translating cultures, not just languages. As I traveled to and from different places, I picked what I liked and what I didn't from each culture that I engaged with, becoming a vastly different child from my other siblings. I was the one listening to salsa while making arepas for my mostly Latino group of friends while my brother was the one listening to American bands like the Lumineers and eating pizza.

My brother and I are two cultural chameleons who have created our own culture from two primary places – our parent's culture of Venezuela and our own American heritage, and thus we are what is known as Third Culture Kids (TCK). This new culture has more to it than simply food and music choices; our very identities, where we feel we belong, where we feel more comfortable, and where we are accepted are all a reflection of this "home" we have created for ourselves.

Third Culture Kids are formed when a child grows up in a host culture different from their parents' culture, then adds other cultures from their environment to make-up their own. These cultural chameleons often feel lost due to being rejected, in some ways, by their parents' culture and ostracized, in other ways, by their host culture. As many TCK say, "I don't belong to a place, I belong to a **people**." It's the people they gravitate towards who influence their lives the most as they search for a place of belonging. This is why gangs have been so popular for many decades; they provide a group of people to belong to for those desperate to attach themselves to a group, rather than a culture or identity.

Third Culture Kids are more likely to struggle with identity, gang involvement, PTSD and other stressors that come from lack of belonging.

Ignoring potential problems can also store up trouble for later, when the TCK becomes an adult. Sometimes a child escapes these violent or traumatizing parent cultures and then is brought up in a host culture that immediately labels and chastises them. These children often feel they have no sense of belonging and lash out against both parents and family, even school and church leaders. "If an individual has had a difficult experience in childhood and hasn't been able to make sense of that, it can be carried into adult life," cautions Kate Berger, a New Yorker who moved to The Netherlands to study and now runs the Expat Kids Club, working with schools and families handling international transitions. She goes on to say, "life as a TCK can create a sense of root-lessness and restlessness, where home is 'everywhere and nowhere.""

While there are some negatives, there are also great positives for TCKs. Many employers love them because they can adapt easy to rapidly changing environments, build relationships and cut losses quickly. They are culturally competent in reading scenarios and individuals quickly and show greater amounts of resiliency than others. When TCK are secure in who they are, they can become some of the best relationship builders, connectors and leaders in the corporate world.

The Corners community is full of these Third Culture Kids, just like me. **At Corners, we have the** opportunity to create a culture of belonging and to nurture these TCKs to be great leaders, community contributors, and great family members. Third Culture Kids force us to embrace an environment in which we can ask the tough questions about identify, belonging, culture, and we are thankful for their value in our community. As we nurture our students to lead full lives, we look forward to helping these TCKs process and develop their own cultural identities in healthy ways to become the leaders they are intended to be.

Corners is such a blessing to my family, which has been part of Corners for many years. Corners has helped us grow so much, personally and academically. Corners helps so many others who are struggling, especially for the Spanish speaking community. They have donated food, clothing, school supplies, and more. They help all these kids that need help with schoolwork, and they motivate them to do better. Corners has the most kindhearted people out there. We are incredibly grateful. People at Corners are so connected to God and it has helped part of my family become closer to Him as well. Corners is truly one of a kind. Thank you.

Corners distributed over 50,000 pounds of food to families in need.

Introducing Scott Mawdesley, New **VP of Corners Academy**

Hello,

For 26 years I've been blessed to work at 5 of the largest churches in America and consult with hundreds more to help build tools and strategies that have literally impacted millions of people across the globe. As much as I have enjoyed this journey, I've never been more excited about an opportunity to lead than I am about my new role as a part of the team here at Corners Outreach! There are so many reasons why, but the biggest reason is that Corners is truly on the cutting edge of non-profit work. I got to see the great work of Corners Outreach first hand as the leader of the Gwinnett Cares Covid-19 response team, a collaborative effort to meet the needs in the pandemic. Through data driven and outcomes based educational and economic development programs, they are helping those that need it most - the poor and vulnerable families across our community. - Scott Mawdesley

Corners Academy focuses on elementary students and their success in learning as a key milestone to high school graduation and life-long success. Before third grade, students learn to read, and after third grade, students read to learn. Corners Academy offers after school tutoring and educational summer camp for elementary students, teen programs, a Mommy and me program for Early Learning, and parent workshops in four different locations. Corners Academy partners directly with each student's school to coordinate a personalized plan.

In 2017, Corners Outreach was running three after school programs connected to three schools, and in 2020, we work with nine school partnerships. Each school is a Title 1 school, which means that there is a high percentage of students on free and



reduced lunch. Many families in the community come from Hispanic cultures and are challenged with issues including language and cultural barriers, disconnection with schools and the education system, and immigration issues. In the 2018-2019 school year, we served more than 752 students through our programs and had parent attendance at workshops of more than 100. Our program directors work closely with teachers, administration, and reading/math specialists to share test scores, academic plans, parent struggles, patterning to advance struggling students.

During the school year, Corners Academy after school tutoring program runs Monday – Thursday with an emphasis on skill building, reading, math, social-emotional learning and homework assistance. More than 50 elementary students attend daily and receive tutoring from part-time certified teachers in small groups, as well as have reading work with volunteers and computer time on Chromebooks. Students build strong personal relationships with volunteers and staff. During the summer, camps run Monday-Thursday mornings with the assistance of volunteer groups. According to Oxford Learning, two months of reading skills are lost in the summer. To help bridge the gap between school years, Corners Academy offers an educational, creative, active, and enjoyable summer opportunity in their neighborhood. Middle school and high school students are developed as leaders discovering unique strengths and gifts.

Perhaps the biggest indicator for high-school graduation is 3rd grade reading level. Those students who are **on reading level** by that age **are** four times more likely to graduate high school. In order to make a real, lasting change in the students' life, our first goal is to have each student reading on grade level (according to the Lexile Framework).

Corners Academy partners with nine Title 1 elementary schools, tutoring students who are the most likely to drop out without intervention.

Corners Teen Development Program

Teen years come with stress, confusion and lots of questions. Corners Academy provides stability, clarity and hope for the teens of our community! The Corners Teen Development program trains, inspires, encourages and mentors teenagers to succeed in all aspects of their life!

Through a weekly adult-guided, peerled environment, teens find community, love and clarity by connecting with likeminded peers and mentors who can guide them with some of the best values-based learning tools.

The Corners Academy teen program aids in:

- · Growing in confidence and selfacceptance,
- Managing stress and discouragement.
- Understanding the keys to a successful life,
- Finding the path into a fulfilling career and job,
- Developing new friendships in a healthy community,
- Having the coaching and wisdom of trustworthy mentors.

The teen program partners with the John Maxwell Leadership Foundation to use their iLead teen curriculum. The format allows students to get experience leading as they take turns facilitating in small groups. Each lesson contains a short teaching on a value or leadership characteristic, asks students to rate how well they practice this characteristic, and asks them to commit to one action step for the week that will allow them to improve their score in this area.



Early Learning Update by Pilar Valdez, Early Learning Director

The mission of our Early Learning program is they get to Kindergarten.

to equip our parents to become their child's **best first teacher.** Our parents are loving and caring but need tools to help their children learn in these critical early learning years. We want all of our Early Learning students to thrive when Many of our sessions are now run by our own moms! We are so excited and proud that our moms have taken on this leadership role. We have grown and are now serving over 35 families through our Early Learning program. We will soon be hiring moms to host entire sessions in order to reach more kids and families. Last summer, we began a summer camp program for our incoming Pre-K and Kindergarten students. We had art days where the students created giant posters of their name that they showed to their parents with pride. Our students also performed different science experiments and became very involved in classroom activities and the *freeze dance song*. Our summer program ran twice a week and we had more than 35 students enrolled throughout the summer. Many of our students started the summer unable


to recognize their number or colors and ended knowing and even spelling them!

Our students made friends who they now see twice a week and ask for when they are absent. It's a great feeling to have moms tell me that their kids wake up asking if it is the day to go see Ms. Pilar and if it's time for school. One of our moms, Maria, will arrive at least ten minutes early because Lupita (her daughter) was rushing her out of the house saying, it is time for school, and we can't be late. Lupita loves to be the first one in the classroom and welcome the rest of her friends into the room. Our relationship with Lupita and her mom has really grown because Maria knows how much we love Lupita and how much we want her to thrive. When Lupita first came to us, she was in a toddler walker and special chair to help hold her up. She'd follow along in our Head, Shoulder, Knees and Toes song and go even faster than me! Our Early Learning program has created a community of moms and children who now support and help one other. There's no doubt that we are better together and have a great Corners family!

Yeferson and his family just moved from Guatemala less than a year ago, and he completed 3rd grade this year. But due to the language barrier, he is very behind. He attended our after school program before the pandemic and developed a good relationship with Ms. Amanda, one of our teachers. Amanda is also working with us during our summer camp and she's has the opportunity to work with Yeferson one on one for three and a half hours each day! He is eager to learn, teachable, and very polite, so we have full confidence that he and Ms. Amanda are shortening the academic gap together.

Moms earned over \$40,000 within several months to survive the worst of times with job loss during the height of Covid-19 shutdowns.

In 2016, Corners Outreach began to recognize that raising academic scores alone would not lead to a higher graduation rate in the Corners community, due to the struggles of living in poverty. **Students in our program who had caught up on reading and math scores were still dropping out of high school to help their family meet their income needs.** Other students saw no path forward to college or higher learning and so abandoned high school before graduating because *what was the point?*

At Corners, we believe that building connection and community takes listening, honoring, empowering, and trusting that there is good in every single person and community. In order to honor an individual or a people group, you must listen. You must meet them where they are and celebrate the gifts inherent to them. Yes, we all have things to improve, but sighting only areas where improvement is needed early in a relationship does not build trust, kindness, or connection.

Corners relies on **Asset Based Community Development** (ABCD) methods to **assess a family's assets, consider how these assets can be used for personal, family and community group, and then develop opportunities for community members that align with these skills.** A survey of our parents' job experience and skills led us to start a lawn care company in 2018, called Lawn Care with a Purpose. The same ABCD method led us to survey moms in 2020 and start a mask sewing business.

Our More Than a Mask Project relied on the assets of our moms, training, buying sewing




